

Nursing Summit 2009 - Use of Technology for Teaching and Staff Development

For the last four years, Catskill Hudson AHEC has offered quality Nursing workshops with diverse topics such as, *The Artistry of Nurse Management*, *Nurse Preceptor Development*, and *Topics in Developing Staff Excellence*. On August 6th, we conducted our 6th Nursing Summit - *Use of Technology for Teaching and Staff Development* in collaboration with Hudson-Mohawk AHEC at the New York State Nurses Association (NYSNA) Conference Center in Latham, NY. Presenters included Dr. Patrick Coonan, Dean and Professor of Adelphi University, School of Nursing; Martha Twichell, Clinical Nurse Specialist and Manager of the Nursing Education Department of Bassett Hospital; Dr. Bridget Nettleton, Dean, Excelsior College, School of Nursing; and Dr. Jeanne-Marie Havener, Chair and Associate Professor of Nursing at Hartwick College.

The purpose of this program was to provide nursing, staff development and clinical educators with an overview of how various technologies could effectively be utilized to enhance education and training in the clinical, simulation, or classroom setting to develop competency

and promote best practices. The workshop also explored innovative ideas for the education and training of a generationally diverse workforce.

The Nursing Summit 2009 was very well received by our audience, as evidenced by the evaluation responses. The highest number of responses were in the “excellent” range. Comments, such as: “*Well done! Good combination of education, practice and research. Continue with this focus and advertise to a larger academic and practice setting population.*” gave us tremendous insight to the value of our program, our audience needs, and a focus for future programs.

Catskill Hudson AHEC Forms Collaboration with SUNY New Paltz STEP Program

Catskill Hudson AHEC recently formed a collaboration with the Science and Technology Entry Program (STEP) of SUNY New Paltz to join forces toward enhancing academic skills of underrepresented students from local high schools and encourage them to continue their education after graduation in the fields of math, science, technology, and the licensed professions. The STEP Program challenges students’ existing skills, develops

new ones, and provides motivation and practical assistance to participants in setting and meeting their educational goals. Catskill Hudson AHEC recognized this opportunity of collaboration, which would introduce students to health careers through our *Who Done It*, *Solve the Medical Mystery* and *Pathways to Success* programs. Our long-term goal is to expand our collaboration to other STEP programs throughout our 11-county region.

7th Annual Cardiovascular Teaching Day Collaboration

On September 26th, Catskill Hudson AHEC (CHAHEC) had the opportunity to collaborate with Twin County Medical Associates (TCMA), Columbia Memorial Hospital (CMH), and the Columbia County Medical Society (CCMS) for the 7th Annual Cardiovascular Teaching Day, which was held at Birch Hill in Schodack, NY. This successful educational program was open to physicians and nurses and offered continuing education credits to 93 attendees. The objective was to meet the healthcare needs of patients with cardiovascular-related diseases. Discussion

topics included pathophysiology, the latest diagnostics, and current treatment modalities with emphasis on preventative care. The expert panel included physicians and researchers from several well-respected institutions in New York State and across the country.

CHAHEC hopes to co-sponsor the 8th Annual Cardiovascular Teaching Day in 2010 and expand it to include health professionals throughout our eleven county region.

A Community-Specific Physician Recruitment and Retention Program

Catskill Hudson AHEC recognizes the vital need to recruit and retain quality healthcare professionals to areas throughout New York State. As a result, HealthMatch was established. HealthMatch is a collaborative effort that brings the commitment of healthcare, business, and civic leaders together in order to provide increased local access to quality healthcare. The need to bring communities together to tackle healthcare access needs is essential. By attracting healthcare professionals to our communities, healthcare is improved, travel outside the community for care is reduced, local economy is stimulated, and a healthier workforce is cultivated. There is a true return on investment when communities commit to HealthMatch because HealthMatch is committed to the communities it serves.

As a result of securing a grant from the New York State Department of Health, a demonstration project of HealthMatch was launched in May 2009, with the Ellenville and Wawarsing communities in southeastern Ulster County. Healthcare Career Highlight - Primary Care

Value and Scope of Family Medicine

Research shows that countries that emphasize primary care have better health outcomes at lower costs. As the U.S. struggles to improve health care delivery, it is clear that primary care providers, especially family physicians, are key to a more effective system.

Primary Care Defined

The Institute of Medicine defines primary care as “the provision of integrated, accessible health care services by clinicians who are accountable for addressing a large majority of personal health care needs, developing a sustained partnership with patients, and practicing in the context of family and community.” According to a 2008 report from the Government Accountability Office (GAO), research shows that “the nation’s over reliance on specialty care services, at the expense of primary care, leads to a health care system that is less efficient.” The GAO also acknowledges that there is research showing that “preventive care, care coordination for the chronically ill, and continuity of care – all hallmarks of primary care medicine – can achieve better health outcomes and cost savings.”

Simply put, primary care is the backbone of the health care system. Utilizing primary care physicians puts an emphasis on the physician-patient relationship by shifting the focus from physician-centered care to patient-centered care.

Scope of Family Medicine

Of the primary care specialties (family medicine, general internal medicine and pediatrics), family physicians provide the most care – managing nearly one-fourth of all primary care visits. Given the scope of family medicine, this comes as no surprise.

Family medicine is a three-dimensional specialty, incorporating (1) knowledge, (2) skill and (3) process. At the center of the process element is the patient-physician relationship with the patient viewed in the context of the family. It is the extent to which this relationship is valued, developed, nurtured and maintained that distinguishes family medicine from all other specialties.

Family physicians integrate the biological, clinical and behavioral sciences to provide continuing and comprehensive health care. Unlike pediatricians, who only provide care for children, and internists, who only provide care for adults, family medicine encompasses all ages, sexes, each organ system and every disease entity. Family physicians also pay special attention to their patients’ lives within the context of family and the community. While there are similarities between family medicine and the other primary care specialties, family physicians have an unprecedented opportunity to have an impact on the health of an individual patient over that person’s entire lifetime.

Demand for Family Physicians

The case for maintaining an adequate family physician workforce is strong. Studies reveal that:

- Family medicine reduces health care costs and increases health care quality.
- Family physicians are geographically distributed across the country more equitably than physicians from any other specialty.
- Family physicians are geographically and financially more accessible to disadvantaged populations that lack access to quality health care than other primary care physicians, which, in turn, helps to reduce health disparities.
- Individuals who regularly visit a family physician are more likely to receive preventive services, better management of chronic illnesses and decreased chance of premature death.

Recruitment data indicates that family physicians are in demand. According to Merritt, Hawkins & Associates, in 2009, family medicine was the highest recruited specialty for the fourth year in a row.
